# Judy Van Ginkel, Ph.D., Retired President, Every Child Succeeds and Professor Emeritus, University of Cincinnati and Cincinnati Children's Hospital Medical Center

Dr. Judy Van Ginkel combines intelligence and compassion in powerful ways. In addition to serving for nearly 20 years as professor of pediatrics at Cincinnati Children's Hospital Medical Center, she created and led a groundbreaking home visiting program, Every Child Succeeds, in 1999, which served more than 57,000 people before she retired from the helm in 2021. Her new book, <u>Chasing Success: The Challenge for Nonprofits</u> (CLIPS, 2023) was listed on <u>LinkedIn for Nonprofits</u> as one of the top 8 "must reads."

#### 1 What's your philosophy for life?

Strong relationships, founded on trust and truthfulness, are key to happiness.

2 Best book you've read lately?

*Necessary Trouble: Growing Up at Midcentury,* by Drew Gilpin Faust, first woman president of Harvard (Farrar Straus & Giroux, 2023). I liked it because she's about my age and articulated perfectly what life was like growing up in the 50s and 60s. She's brave and smart, and has a lot to say about equity.

I'd like to see policies that put stronger emphasis on the health of children 0 to 3, because research has shown us that the first three years of life are more important than any 3 that follow. If we can give all children a better start, it will alleviate many of the problems that come later.

#### 6 What made you choose your career path?

I'd always been interested in things related to good health and medicine. After undergrad studying literature and history, I became interested in healthcare (it's a family thing). In grad school, I realized that I wanted to help improve the healthcare system and services available for children.

John Pepper, former president of Proctor & Gamble. He's both a friend and a colleague, and one of the wisest people I've ever encountered.

I'm from West Virginia—it's always country!
