Covering the Actual Cost of College

For the past six years, scholarships from Say Yes Cleveland have helped more than 700 students from Cleveland Metropolitan School District attend and graduate from college. Say Yes Cleveland began by covering the cost of college tuition and fees but quickly realized that financial gaps remained that posed a steep barrier for many would-be college students.

"The costs that come after tuition—including books, room and board, transportation, and more—can still be substantial, especially for students who want and deserve the full on-campus experience," said Maggie McGrath, a member of the executive leadership

team at College Now, the nonprofit that manages the distribution of scholarship funding to higher education institutions.

Say Yes Cleveland expanded its support to include many of these expenses, but gaps remained. The ACS Fund for Women & Girls, created by Advocacy & Communication Solutions, LLC (ACS) saw that need and eagerly lent additional support through four new scholarships for young women attending either the University of Cincinnati or the College of Wooster—the respective alma maters of ACS founders Lori McClung and Scarlett Bouder.

"We remembered from our own college days how challenging some of the expenses could be, and those have only increased since then," said McClung.

The ACS Fund provides scholarships of \$2,000 per year for up to four years that students can use for any college-related expense. The first four scholarship recipients are currently immersed in their freshman years and are pursuing big dreams.

Alana Correa wants to become a doctor of obstetrics and gynecology. "What solidified my wanting to be an OB-GYN was hearing all of the horror stories of how women of color were being treated or neglected and as a young woman of color myself, that is scary," she said.

KeiZiya LeiKaila Simone Doctor is diving into biochemistry with the goal of becoming a dentist. Despite the rigor of her science courses, she's committed to studying hard to maintain a B grade point average or higher.

Vee Johnson is looking forward to promoting men's mental health through a career in sports administration. "I care deeply about men's mental health, specifically Black men's mental health, and I feel like sports help them express their emotions that they wouldn't be

able to otherwise. I enjoy being a part of that process," she said.

In addition to financial support, every Say Yes scholarship recipient is paired with a mentor from the Cleveland community and is assigned a success coach from their college campus or College Now. "From admissions to graduation, College Now and Say Yes are there with the student for their whole journey," said McGrath.
